2023 Denver Public Safety Survey Results

Top Public Safety Concerns

The top public safety concerns for the City of Denver and Denver Police Department's seven districts and 78 neighborhoods are reported based on quantitative results from the Denver Public Safety Survey in response to the question "What, if any, are current public safety and security concerns in the neighborhood where you live and/or work? Select all that apply."

Most Prominent Themes

The most prominent themes for the City of Denver and Denver Police Department's seven districts and neighborhoods were identified from narrative comments in survey responses to questions "Do you have any additional thoughts on public safety and security issues in Denver, generally, or your neighborhood, specifically, that you would like to share?" and "Do you have any thoughts on the Neighborhood Safety Plans that you would like to share?"

Measures of Community Perceptions of Public Safety

The survey included question sets that make up distinct scales that measure community perceptions of police, neighborhood features, and crime as related to public safety. Results are reported for question sets measuring Police Legitimacy, Collective Efficacy-Informal Social Control, Collective Efficacy-Social Cohesion, Fear of Crime, and Social Disorganization.

Introduction and Overview

Denver Police Department's Neighborhood Safety Plans

The Denver Police Department's (DPD) Neighborhood Safety Plans (NSP) were implemented in October 2023. The DPD NSP, modeled after the Seattle Police Department's Micro-Community Policing Plans (Helfgott & Parkin, 2018), is based on the notion that public safety can be enhanced, and crime reduced through collaborative police-community attention to distinctive needs of Denver neighborhoods with focused crime control, crime prevention and quality of life strategies on neighborhood-specific priorities. The DPD NSP recognizes that no two Denver neighborhoods are alike and that resident perceptions of crime and public safety at the neighborhood level matter. The NSPs take a three-prong approach to bring together community engagement, crime data, and police services. NSPs are tailored to meet the individual needs of each neighborhood with a unique approach owned by the community. When used in conjunction with crime data, information gathered through community engagement to develop the NSPs that take into account resident perceptions at the neighborhood level provide a much more accurate picture of the reality of crime and public safety than does official crime data alone. This utilization of resident feedback and community perception of crime and public safety used in conjunction with official crime data to understand and address the reality of crime in communities makes the NSP strategy unique. A central component of the NSP is the Denver Public Safety Survey that was first administered from October 15 - December 8, 2023. The survey is an expansion of the Seattle Police Department's Micro-Community Policing Plans' annual Seattle Public Safety Survey that has been distributed in the city of Seattle since 2015. The Denver Public Safety Survey is independently conducted by a research team from Seattle University Department of Criminal Justice including Dr. Jacqueline Helfgott (Principal Investigator), Dr. Matthew Hickman (Co-Investigator), and graduate student research analysts Brandon Bledsoe (University of Cincinnati) and Shannon Christensen (Southern Illinois University - Carbondale).

The 2023 Denver Public Safety Survey

The Denver Public Safety Survey is a non-probability survey designed as part of the DPD NSP evaluation to collect data from residents at citywide, district, and neighborhood levels regarding public safety issues, perceptions of police and neighborhood features, and crime as related to public safety, fear of crime, crime victimization. The purpose of the survey is to collect data about what matters to residents regarding public safety, neighborhoods and communities, and the police to better understand the priorities of residents in conjunction with official crime statistics and other avenues collected by DPD. The 2023 survey was administered online and on paper from October 15 – December 8, 2023. The survey was available in 13 languages - Arabic, Burmese, Cambodian, English, French, Farsi, Hindi, Mandarin, Nepalese, Russian, Spanish, Somali, and Vietnamese and administered by DPD via Nextdoor.com, outreach emails, Ring.com, and Hello Lamppost.

Hello Lamp Post was used in the 2023 administration of the Denver Public Safety Survey to enhance community outreach, inclusivity, and accessibility (See: <https://www.hlp.city/>). *Hello Lamp Post* is a human-centric engagement solution that makes physical places, spaces, and objects interactive using simple, text-based conversations that people interact with through signs placed on objects in the environment. *Hello Lamp Post* signs were posted in each of the 78 neighborhoods in Denver during the survey administration to provide community members access to the survey link and interactive conversation about the survey making participation a more dynamic experience. The inclusion of

Hello Lamp Post in the survey administration outreach will provide additional data on the number and nature of interactions in different neighborhoods, the questions community members have about the survey, and demographics of those who interact with the signage. Text messages which provide the lowest barrier to entry, are a familiar form of communication for all ages, and people can use a basic mobile phone to participate. Hello Lamp Post signage provides a 24/7-365 touchpoint to provide information and services outside normal business hours with signage and communication translated into the languages prominent in the respective neighborhoods. The partnership with Hello Lamp Post will enhance survey administration by providing a cost and time efficient police-community engagement communication strategy that will increase accessibility and inclusivity. Hello Lamp Post signs provide the ability to reach and connect with more people because of the “always on” nature of the signage and additional qualitative and quantitative data (e.g., engagement at specific locations, the sorts of questions community member ask about the survey).

How the Denver Public Safety Survey Results Inform the Denver Police Neighborhood Safety Plans

The Denver Public Safety Survey results offer DPD comprehensive data reflecting the views of residents at citywide, district, and neighborhood levels to inform the DPD NSP priorities and strategies. The specific goal of the survey is to collect data that captures citywide resident concerns about public safety, police, and neighborhoods to inform the DPD NSPs. The survey findings supplement official crime statistics and traditional precinct-level methods of identifying community concerns (e.g., police-community meetings, ad-hoc precinct surveys) to ensure that the NSP priorities and strategies are closely aligned with the public safety concerns of all residents within the city, districts, and neighborhoods.

Description of Indices and Scales included in the Denver Public Safety Survey

Indices of Top Concerns and Prominent Themes

For the 2023 results, the top public safety concerns and the themes identified within respondents' comments are presented as both individual items and as those items aggregated into indices. This allows communities and law enforcement to engage in discussions about broader issues (e.g., property crime) as well as the items that may be one component of that broader issue (e.g., car prowls). At the citywide, district, and neighborhood levels, the top indices are reported both as public safety concern indices and theme indices. The 9 public safety concern indices were conceptually identified from 71 items and are comprised of anywhere between 5 to 12 items. The 25 theme indices were conceptually identified from 88 items and are comprised of anywhere between 1 to 15 items. All public safety concerns and theme results for indices and items are reported in this report's appendices for Denver citywide, the seven districts, and all 78 neighborhoods. This provides transparency specific to how concerns and themes rank across and within varying geographies, as well as the number of respondents connected to those geographies.

To construct the public safety concern indices, the number of items in an index that a respondent identified as a public safety concern were summed and then divided by the total number of items used to create that index. This proportion represented the average number of items a respondent identified within an index. To determine which public safety concerns were most important to Denver,

a district, or a neighborhood, the individual respondent proportions were then averaged within the varying locations in which they lived and/or worked. Indices and items with higher proportions or percentages, relative to other indices and items, are of greater concern to the survey respondents and their communities.

To construct the theme indices, the number of items in an index that were identified as themes within a respondent's comments were summed and then divided by the total number of items used to create that index. This proportion represented the average number of themes identified within a respondent's comments for an index. Respondents were not required to comment. However, the majority of respondents did provide additional thoughts on public safety and security in Denver. To determine which themes were most important to Denver, a district, or a neighborhood, the individual respondent proportions were then averaged within the varying locations in which they lived and/or worked. Averages were determined using the number of respondents who commented within a specific geography, not the number of total respondents for that geography. Theme indices and items with higher proportions or percentages, relative to other indices and items, were more frequently mentioned in respondents' comments.

Measures of Community Perceptions of Public Safety

The 2023 Denver Public Safety Survey included question sets that make up distinct scales that measure community perceptions of police, neighborhood features, and crime as related to public safety based on prior research on aspects of communities that impact resident perceptions of public safety. The scales included in the survey focus on seven areas of interest: **Police Legitimacy, Collective Efficacy-Informal Social Control, Collective Efficacy-Social Cohesion, Social Disorganization, and Fear of Crime.**

How Scale Data Can Be Used to Improve Public Safety

The scale data can be used in conjunction with the top concerns and prominent themes to better understand the nature of communities and neighborhoods and their unique public safety issues. Concerns of residents within any given neighborhood may differ in terms of perceptions of public safety with respect to police legitimacy, informal social control, social cohesion, fear of crime, and social disorganization, perceptions of the DPD Neighborhood Safety Plans, and knowledge of the DPD Neighborhood Safety Plans. The survey findings on the scales can be used in conjunction with the top concerns and prominent themes at the community and neighborhood levels to inform and guide law enforcement in developing priorities and to guide strategies in response to distinct community concerns providing a snapshot of the nature of the district as a whole and the individual neighborhoods regarding resident views of aspects of communities related to public safety. Ideally, a healthy community with positive police-community relations will have positive perception and high knowledge of the DPD NSP, high police legitimacy, high informal social control, high social cohesion, low social disorganization, and low fear of crime. Survey findings can assist communities to target areas of improvement with respect to areas that stray from the ideal and negatively impact public safety.



Law Enforcement Trust & Legitimacy.

Police legitimacy is an important concept relevant to public safety as it has been consistently found that law enforcement relies on police legitimacy for individuals to cooperate/comply with and support their departments. Gau (2014) defines police legitimacy as “an acceptance of the rules, laws, and precepts that define the police role in society, and a willingness to grant deference to police as a consequence of the belief that they are the authorized representatives who dutifully carry out the rules and laws that make society function smoothly” (p. 189). Police legitimacy is an important concept to public safety as it has been consistently found that law enforcement relies on police legitimacy for individuals to cooperate/comply with and support their departments (Gau, 2014; Reisig et al., 2007; Tyler, 2006; Tankebe, 2013). The questions in the Denver Public Safety survey build on scales developed by Sunshine and Tyler (2003) as well as other research (Gau, 2014 and Reisig et al., 2007, Tyler, 2006; and Tankebe, 2013). In addition, research shows that procedural justice presents an important indicator of levels of police legitimacy within a community and thus questions related to procedural justice were included in the survey (Gau, 2014; Reisig et al., 2007). Resident’s perception of procedural justice can be informed by sources that go beyond ones’ personal experience, including experiences of friends/family, as well as the presentation of police actions in the media (Gau, 2014). The concept is operationalized by asking respondents to what extent they agree with certain statements when thinking about law enforcement and how they are treated. Finally, questions were included related to trust and residents’ perceived obligation to obey law enforcement officers. While the concept of trust is defined as “people’s beliefs that legal authorities are fair, are honest, and uphold people’s rights” (Tyler & Huo, 2002, p. 78-79), perceived obligation to obey is defined as the extent to which people feel “they should comply with directives from police officers ... irrespective of their personal feelings” (Tyler, 2006, p. 45). In the effort to assess residents’ trust and the obligation to obey, a series of questions ask about how much respondents agree that DPD officers are honest and protect the rights of the residents, as well as whether residents should obey orders and accept decisions made by law enforcement. Additionally, respondents were asked about their personal interactions with a Denver police officer in the past year as well as a question asking about views of police at the local and national levels.

The Denver Public Safety Survey questions build from scales developed by other research showing that procedural justice presents an important indicator of levels of police legitimacy within a community. The concept is operationalized by asking respondents to what extent they agree with certain statements when thinking about your law enforcement agency and how they are treated. Finally, there are also questions related to trust and residents’ perceived obligation to obey law enforcement officers. Questions in the Denver Public Safety Survey that measure police legitimacy scale include:

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Denver Police Department and its officers?

- _____ Denver police officers protect people's basic rights in the neighborhood.
- _____ Denver police officers are honest.
- _____ Denver police officers do their jobs well.
- _____ Denver police officers can be trusted to do the right thing for my neighborhood.
- _____ I am proud of Denver police officers.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Denver Police Department and its officers?

- _____ I have confidence in Denver police officers.
- _____ When a Denver police officer issues an order, you should do what they say, even if you disagree with it.
- _____ You should accept Denver police officers' decisions even if you think they're wrong.
- _____ People should do what Denver police officers say, even when they do not like the way the police treat them.
- _____ Denver police officers treat people with respect and dignity.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Denver Police Department and its officers?

- _____ Denver police officers respect citizen's rights.
- _____ Denver police officers treat everyone equally.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Denver Police Department and its officers?

- _____ Denver police officers make decisions to handle problems fairly.
- _____ Denver police officers listen to all of the citizens involved before deciding what to do.

Collective Efficacy: Informal Social Control & Social Cohesion.

Collective efficacy has been defined as the connection between mutual trust and willingness to intervene for the common good. The concept is most often conceptualized as a combination of informal social control and social cohesion. Collective efficacy is “the linkage of mutual trust and the willingness to intervene for the common good that defines the neighborhood context of collective efficacy” (Sampson, Raudenbush, & Earls, 1997, p. 919). The concept is most often conceptualized as a combination of informal social control and social cohesion. Both scales, informal social control and social cohesion, are built on the work of Uchida, et al. (2014), which represents a modified version of a scale developed by Sampson, Raudenbush, & Earl (1997) and Sampson & Raudenbush (1999).

To assess resident's willingness to react to crime and deviancy, participants were asked to indicate how likely it is that one of their neighbors would do something about specific incidences, such as break-ins, parking infractions, suspicious people hanging around, loud arguments on the street, underage drinking, juvenile spray-painting graffiti, someone being beaten/threatened in front of their house, disrespectful behavior by juveniles, juveniles skipping school, loud music/noise on their block, gun shots fired, and drug selling.

Social cohesion was assessed by asking participants to indicate to what extent they agree with specific statements about their community/neighborhood (e.g. “this neighborhood is a good area to raise children” or “people that live in my neighborhood are generally friendly”). Questions included in the survey designed to measure the construct of informal social control through resident willingness to react to a range of crime and deviancy events include:

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being very unlikely and 100 being very likely, how likely is it that someone in the neighborhood where you live and/or work would intervene if they would witness one of the following?

- Someone is trying to break into a house/business.
- Someone is illegally parking in the street.
- Suspicious people are hanging around the neighborhood.
- People are having a loud argument in the street.
- A group of underage kids is drinking alcohol.
- Some children are spray-painting graffiti on a local building.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being very unlikely and 100 being very likely, how likely is it that someone in the neighborhood where you live and/or work would intervene if they would witness one of the following?

- There is a fight in front of your house/work and someone is being beaten or threatened.
- A child is showing disrespect to an adult.
- A group of neighborhood children is skipping school and hanging out on a street corner.
- Someone on your block is playing loud music.
- Someone on your block is firing a gun.
- Drugs are being sold.

Social cohesion, the second component of collective efficacy, is assessed in the survey by asking participants to indicate to what extent they agree with specific statements about their community/ neighborhood:

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following about the neighborhood where you live and/or work?

- The neighborhood is a good area to raise children.
- People in the neighborhood are generally friendly.
- I am happy I live/work in the neighborhood.
- People in the neighborhood take care of each other.
- People in the neighborhood can be trusted.
- People in the neighborhood are willing to help each other.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following about the neighborhood where you live and/or work?

- The neighborhood is close-knit.
- People in the neighborhood generally don't get along with each other.
- People in the neighborhood do not share the same values.
- I regularly stop and talk with people in the neighborhood.
- I know the names of people in the neighborhood.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following about the neighborhood where you live and/or work?

- I share responsibility for the quality of life and safety in the neighborhood.
- In the last year, I have been active in helping to improve the quality of life and safety in the neighborhood.

Fear of Crime.

Fear of crime is central to the concept of public safety, due to the argument that fear of crime can have a negative impact not only on the individual but also on communities. Fear of crime can influence residents' behaviors and movements, economics, and social life and can be seen as a "key quality of life" issue (Cordner 2010). It is also important to understand that the effects of fear of crime can outweigh the effects of actual crime on individuals and communities (Warr, 2000). The items utilized in the survey mirror the fear of crime scale developed by Gray, Jackson, & Farall (2008), which was built on the work of Farrall and Gadd (2004). To get a better understanding of residents' level of fear of crime, participants are asked how worried they have been in the last year about specific crimes in their neighborhood. Identical questions were included with the distinction of fear of crime during the nighttime and daytime. Table 4 shows question items included to measure fear of crime:

Social Disorganization.

To gain a better understanding about the social stability and order of the community the concept of social disorganization, which is argued to be capable in predicting crime, was included in the survey. The classical measures of social disorganization (e.g., residents' socioeconomic status and ethnic heterogeneity) can be assessed through demographic questions (Shaw & McKay, 1942; Sampson & Groves, 1989). These measures can be augmented with questions regarding the perceived level of social disorder and the perceived level of physical disorder, which are also included to assess to what degree certain signs of disorder are a matter of concern to your community (Weisburd et al., 2012; Steenbeek & Hipp, 2011). Questions included in the survey to measure social disorganization include:

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often are the following a problem in the neighborhood where you live and/or work?

- _____ Fights on the street/threatening behavior.
- _____ People loitering or being disorderly.
- _____ Public alcohol/drug consumption.
- _____ Public urination or defecation.
- _____ Panhandling.
- _____ Vandalism.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often are the following a problem in the neighborhood where you live and/or work?

- _____ Noise late at night/early in the morning.
- _____ Gambling in the street.
- _____ Drug sales.
- _____ Illegal sex work.
- _____ People being bothered on the street.
- _____ Buildings with broken windows.

On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often are the following a problem in the neighborhood where you live and/or work?

- _____ Buildings with graffiti.
- _____ Abandoned or boarded up buildings.
- _____ Areas with litter.
- _____ Dog feces on the street or sidewalk.

Denver - Citywide Survey Results

Denver Citywide Survey Results Overview

Results are presented from 6,341 completed survey responses from community members who indicated they live and/or work in the City of Denver. Compared to Denver demographics, survey respondents were disproportionately more likely to be non-minority and female. Quantitative responses were weighted based on gender and race/ethnicity to better represent the Denver population. Of the total 6,341 citywide responses (Unweighted N=6,135), 3,157 of respondents offered narrative comments. Narrative comments were analyzed for themes and 88 distinct themes were identified.

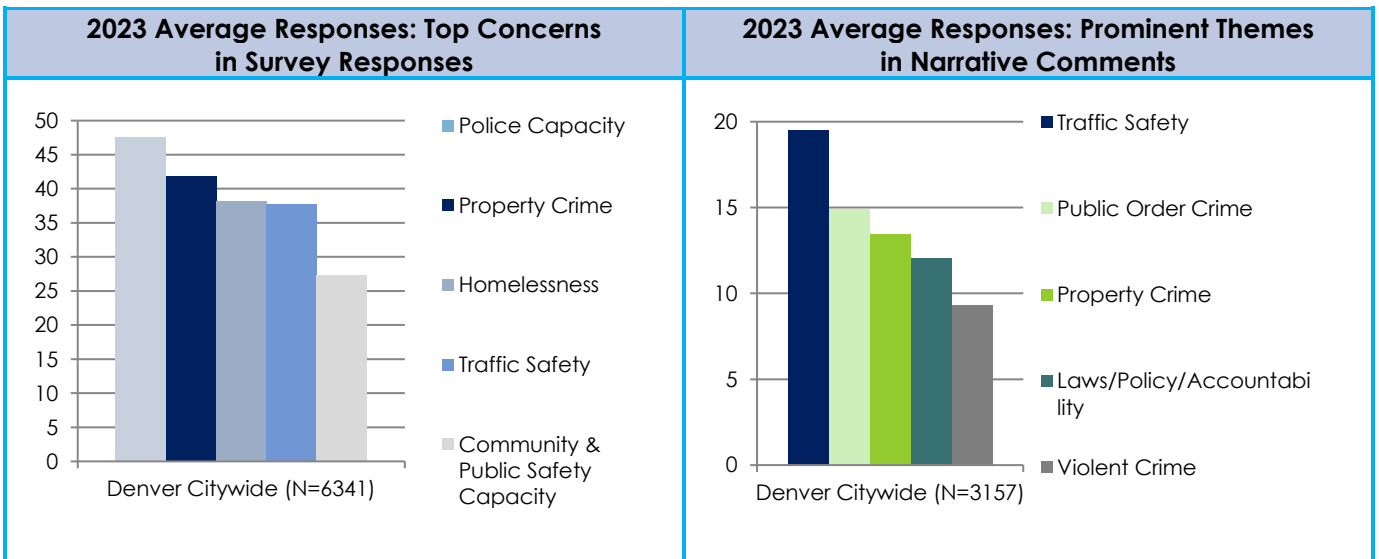

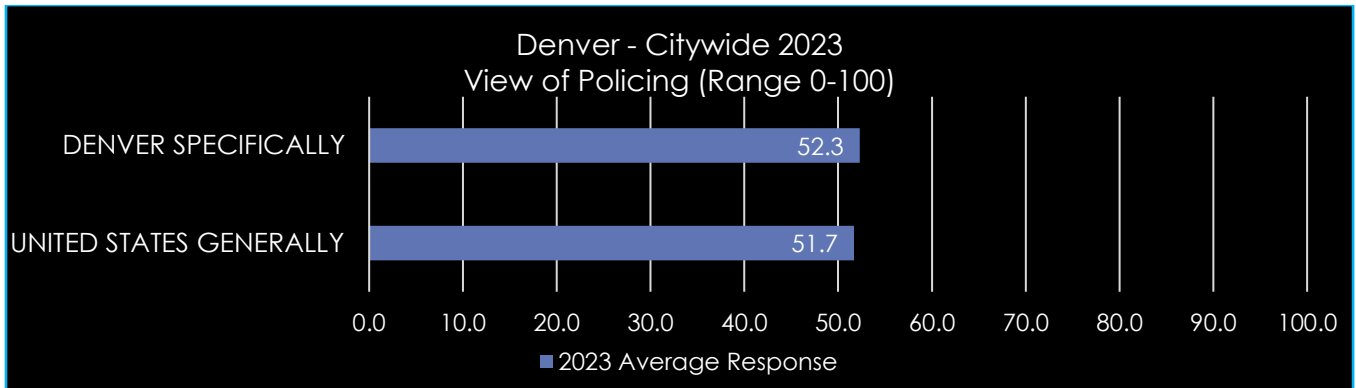
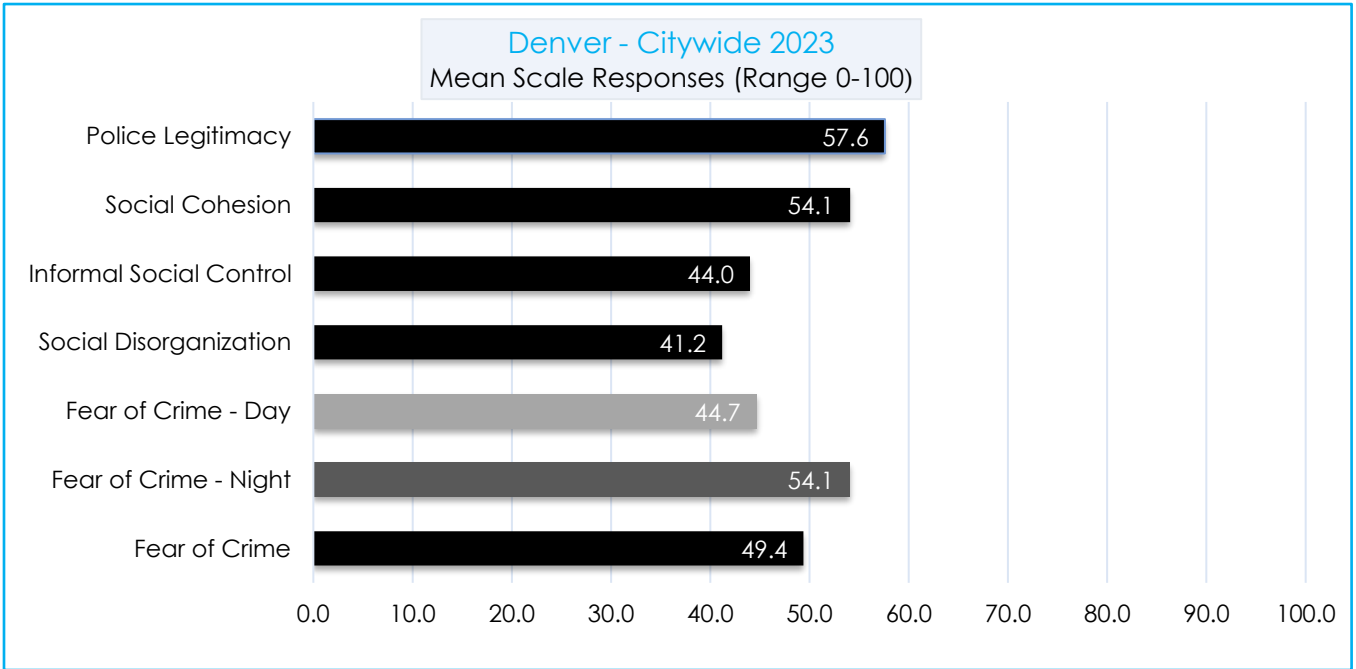

Summary of Findings Citywide

The top public safety concerns are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, Traffic Safety, and Community Capacity. The most prominent themes residents in the city of Denver commented on in their narrative responses are Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Fear of Crime.

Regarding the scales measuring aspects of neighborhood public safety, Citywide scale ratings show high-moderate Police Legitimacy (57.6), moderate Social Cohesion (54.1), low-moderate Informal Social Control (44.0), low-moderate Social Disorganization (41.2), and moderate Fear of Crime (Overall – 49.4, Day – 44.7, Night – 54.1).

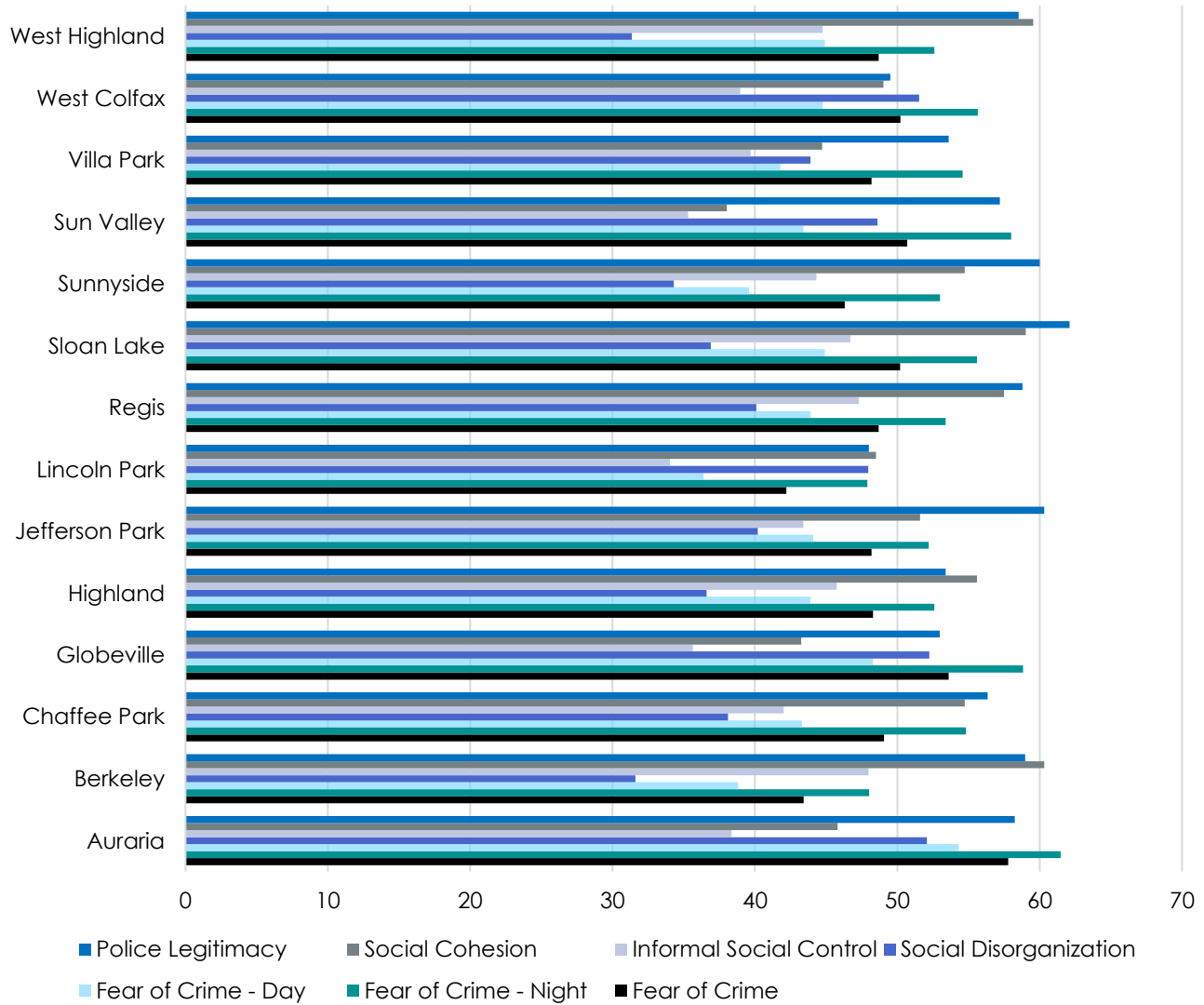


Summary of Findings for District 1

The top public safety concerns for District 1 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Drugs & Alcohol. In comparison with the top public safety concerns Citywide, residents in District 1 shared the same top four of five public safety concerns including Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, and Traffic Safety. Drugs & Alcohol replaced Community Capacity in District 1 when compared to Citywide results. Additionally, the rankings of Homelessness and Traffic Safety switched in District 1 as respondents ranked Traffic Safety as the third highest concern and Homelessness as the fourth highest concern. The most prominent theme indices residents in District 1 identified in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability, and Violent Crime. In comparison with the top Citywide theme indices (Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability), Fear of Crime fell out of the top five while Laws/Policy/Accountability became the fourth most prominent theme in District 1. Violent crime dropped to the fifth most prominent theme. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were relatively diverse with six neighborhoods having the same top public safety concerns as the entirety of District 1 (Auraria, Globeville, Lincoln Park, Sun Valley, Villa Park, West Colfax). However, Sunnyside and Villa Park were the only neighborhoods to have the same top 5 narrative themes as District 1 as a whole.

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety suggest that District 1 have scale ratings of moderate (54.6) Police Legitimacy, moderate (51.7) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (40.5) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (41.7) Social Disorganization, and moderate (47.8) Fear of Crime (42.6-Day, 53.1-Night). The average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 54.6 in District 1 is three points lower than the Citywide average rating of 57.6. District 1 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 51.7, which is 3.6 points lower than the Citywide average of 54.1. Additionally, the average Informal Social Control scale rating of 40.5 in District 1 is 3.5 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The findings on the scale items for District 1 show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 41.7, which is only 0.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. Social Disorganization is the only scale item that District 1 rates higher than Citywide. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 1 of 42.6 is 2.1 points less than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 1 of 53.1 is just one point less than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Finally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 1 of 47.8 is 1.6 points less than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are different depending on the neighborhood with some very similar to District 1 as a whole (e.g., Chaffee Park) while others show rather drastic differences (e.g., Auraria, Regis, Lincoln Park) reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the district. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 1 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 50.9 is 1.4 points lower than the Citywide rating of 52.3 for DPD Specifically. Finally, District 1's rating of police in the United States Generally of 49.4 is 2.3 points lower than the Citywide rating of 51.7 for police in the United States Generally.

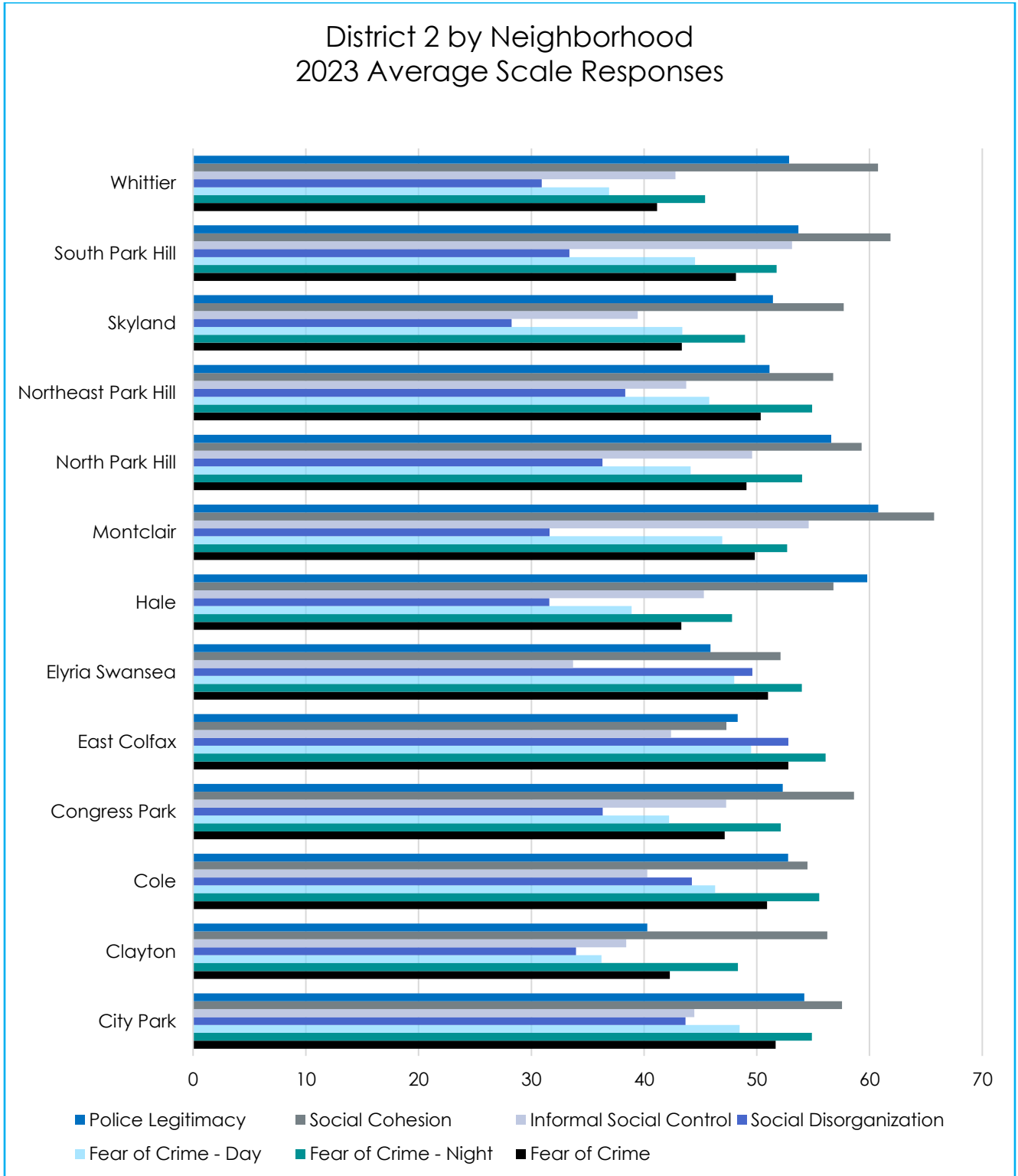


Summary of Findings for District 2

The top public safety concerns for District 2 in 2023 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Community Capacity. These are the same concerns reported at the Citywide level. The only difference between the top five concerns in District 2 compared to Citywide is that District 2 ranked Traffic Safety as the third most prominent concern and Homelessness as the fourth most prominent concern. The most prominent themes reported in District 2 narrative comments are Traffic Safety, Property Crime, Public Order Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were primarily consistent with seven neighborhoods having the same top public safety concerns as the entirety of District 2 (City Park, Congress Park, Hale, Montclair, North Park Hill, Northeast Park Hill, South Park Hill). However, City Park, Hale, North Park Hill, and South Park Hill were the only neighborhoods to have the same top 5 narrative themes as District 2 as a whole.

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety suggest that District 2 scale ratings show moderate (51.5) Police Legitimacy, moderate (54.5) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (40.5) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (43.9) Social Disorganization, and moderate (49.3) Fear of Crime (44.6 - Day, 53.8 - Night). The findings on the scale items for District 2 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 51.5 is 6.1 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 2 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 55.5, which is 2.4 points higher than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating in District 2 for Informal Social Control is 40.5, which is 3.5 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The average on the scale for District 2 Social Disorganization is 43.9, which is just 2.7 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 2 of 44.6 is 0.1 units lower than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 2 of 53.8 is 0.3 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 2 of 49.3 is 0.1 less than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are different depending on the neighborhood with some very similar to District 1 as a whole (e.g., Cole, North Park Hill, Northeast Park Hill) while others show rather drastic differences (e.g., Clayton, Montclair) reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the

district. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 2 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 47.6 is 4.7 points lower than the Citywide rating of 52.3. Finally, in ratings of the police in the United States Generally, the average response for District 2 was 48.0 – 3.7 points lower than the Citywide rating of 51.7.

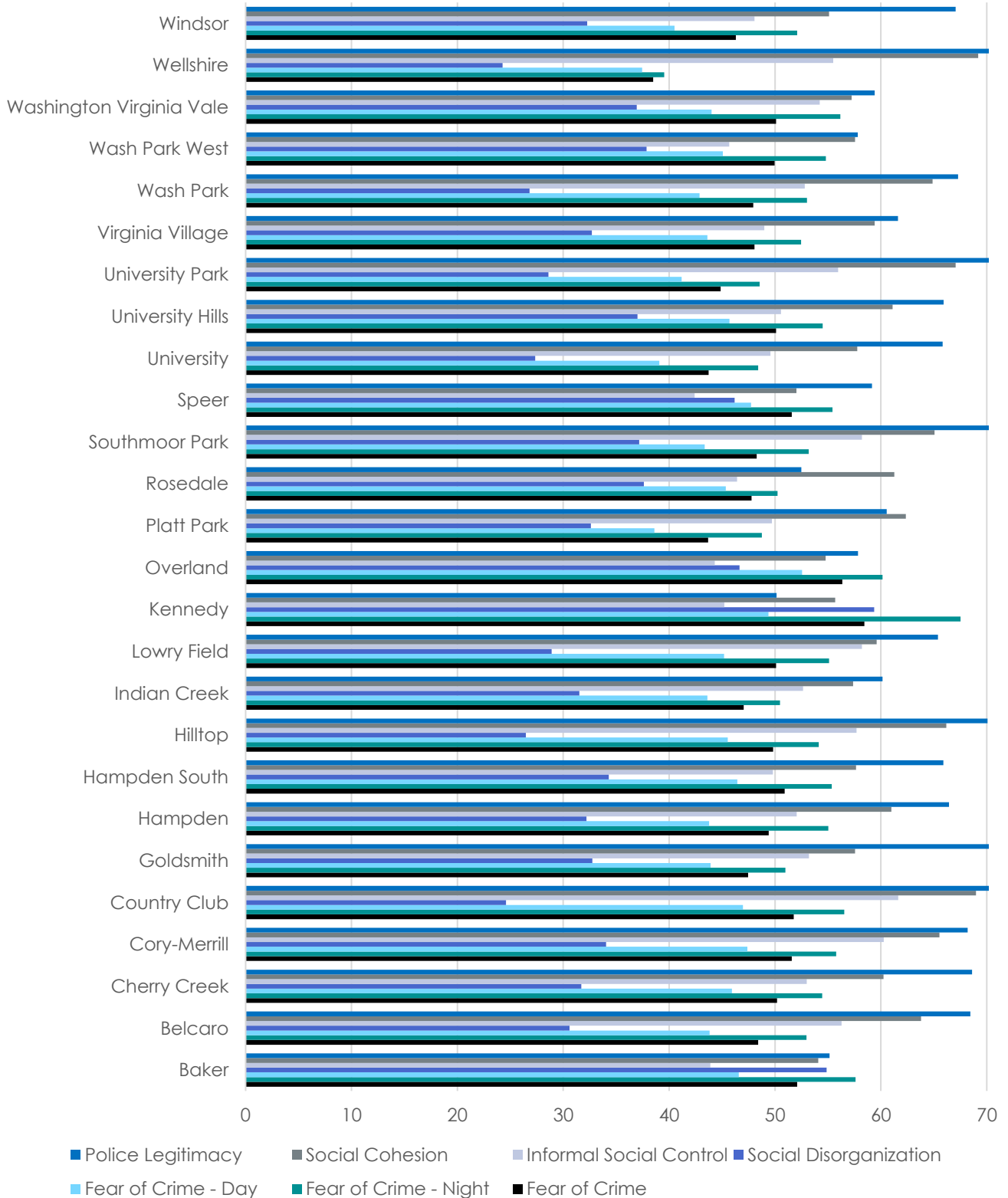


Summary of Findings for District 3

The top public safety concerns for District 3 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, Traffic Safety and Community Capacity. The top concerns in District 3 mirrored the Citywide concerns in rankings and items. The most prominent themes respondents in District 3 included in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Property Crime, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. In comparison, the themes most noted by residents Citywide were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. Although themes are mostly consistent at the Citywide and District 3 levels, there are a few notable differences. Property Crime rose to the second highest theme while Public Order Crime fell to the third highest theme in District 3. Fear of Crime rose from fifth to the fourth highest theme. Finally, Violent Crime did not make the top five in District 3 while Laws/Policy/Accountability became the fourth most prominent theme. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were highly consistent with the entirety of District 3 as 21 neighborhoods shared the same top public safety concerns (Belcaro, Cherry Creek, Cory-Merrill, Country Club, Goldsmith, Hampden, Hampden South, Hilltop, Indian Creek, Overland, Platt Park, Rosedale, Southmoor Park, University, University Hills, University Park, Virginia Village, Wash Park, Wash Park West, Washington Virginia Vale, Wellshire). Narrative themes at the neighborhood level were also consistent with District 3 as 10 neighborhoods shared the same top themes as District 3 as a whole (Baker, Belcaro, Cherry Creek, Hampden South, Platt Park, Speer, University, University Hills, Wash Park West, Windsor).

The results on scales measuring community perceptions of public safety in District 3 shows scale rating of high-moderate Police Legitimacy (61.2), high-moderate Social Cohesion (58.6), moderate Informal Social Control (49.1), low Social Disorganization (35.9) and moderate (48.7) Fear of Crime (43.9-Day, 53.4-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 3 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 61.2 is 3.6 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 3 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 58.6 which is 4.5 points higher than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating for Informal Social Control in District 3 is 49.1 – 5.1 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The average Social Disorganization scale of 35.9 in District 3 is 5.3 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 3 of 43.9 is 0.8 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 53.4 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 3 of 53.6 is also 0.2 points below the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 3 of 48.7 is 0.7 points less than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. 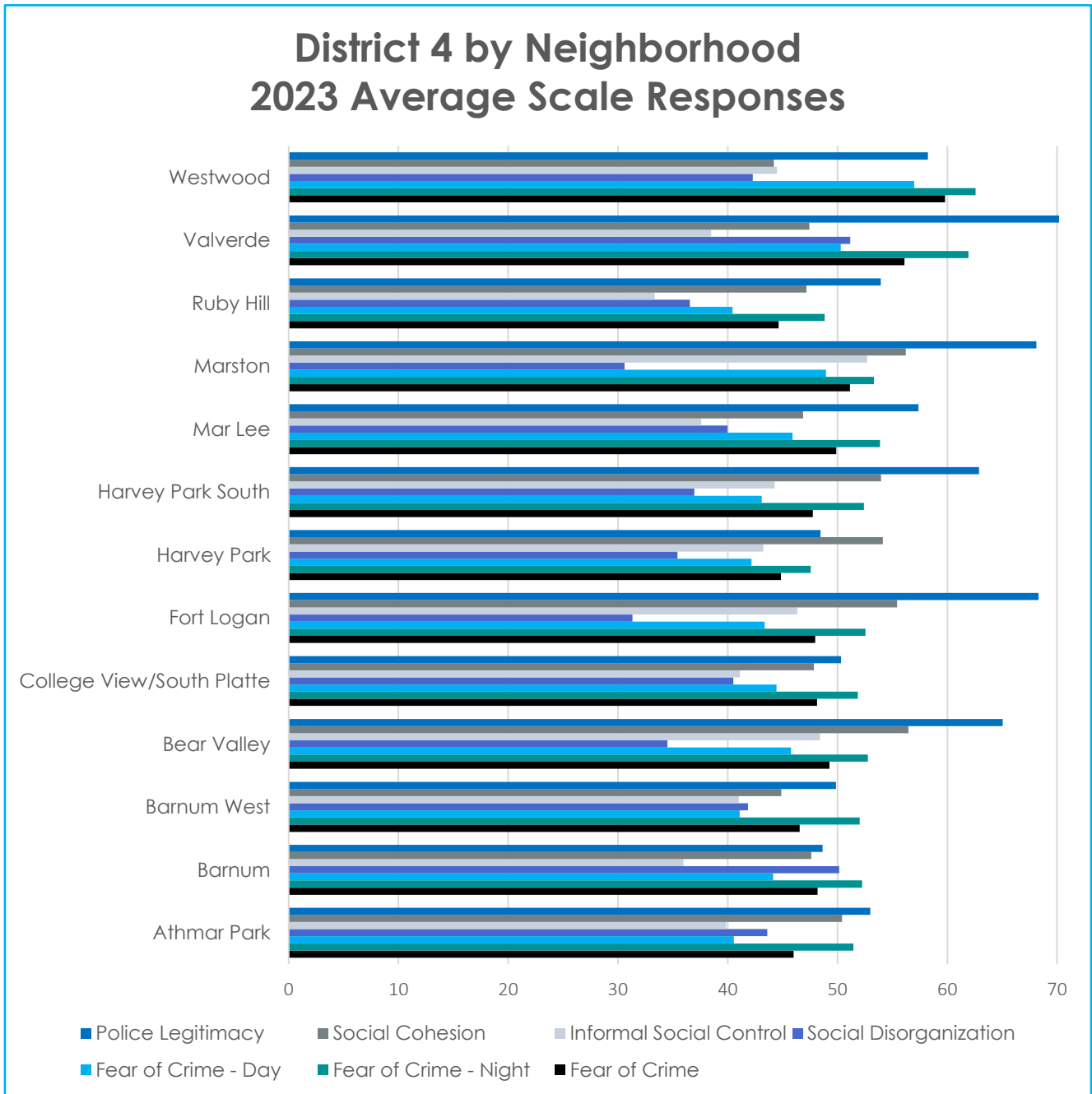
Summary of Findings for District 4

The top public safety concerns for District 4 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Community Capacity. These are the same concerns that were reported at the Citywide level. The only difference in top public safety concerns between the Citywide and District 4 levels were that Traffic Safety was ranked third and Homelessness was ranked fourth in District 4. The most prominent themes residents in District 4 noted in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Violent Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability which were also the same themes reported in the top Citywide rankings. The only difference was in ranking as Violent Crime moved to the third most prominent theme and Property Crime dropped to the fourth most prominent theme in District 4. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were relatively consistent with the entirety of District 4 as seven neighborhoods shared the same top public safety concerns (Barnum, Barnum West, Bear Valley, Fort Logan, Harvey Park, Harvey Park South, Marston).

The results of the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that District 4 has a scale rating of moderate (55.3) Police Legitimacy, moderate (50.4) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (41.6) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (38.5) Social Disorganization, and moderate (47.6) Fear of Crime (43.7-Day, 51.6-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 4 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 55.3 is 2.3 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 4 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 50.4 which is 3.7 points lower than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating of 41.6 for Informal Social Control in District 4 is 2.4 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. Further, the findings on the scale items for District 4 show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 38.5, which is 2.7 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 4 of 43.7 is one point lower than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 4 of 51.6 is 2.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 4 of 47.6 is 1.8 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales

...

are mainly consistent with District 4 as a whole (e.g., Ruby Hill, Harvey Park South) while a few show rather drastic differences (e.g., Barnum, Fort Logan) reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the district. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 4 show that the rating of DPD Specifically of 51.1 is 2.2 points lower than the Citywide rating of 52.3. District 4 rating of police in the United States Generally was 50.8, which is 0.9 points lower than the Citywide rating of 51.7 for the United States Generally.

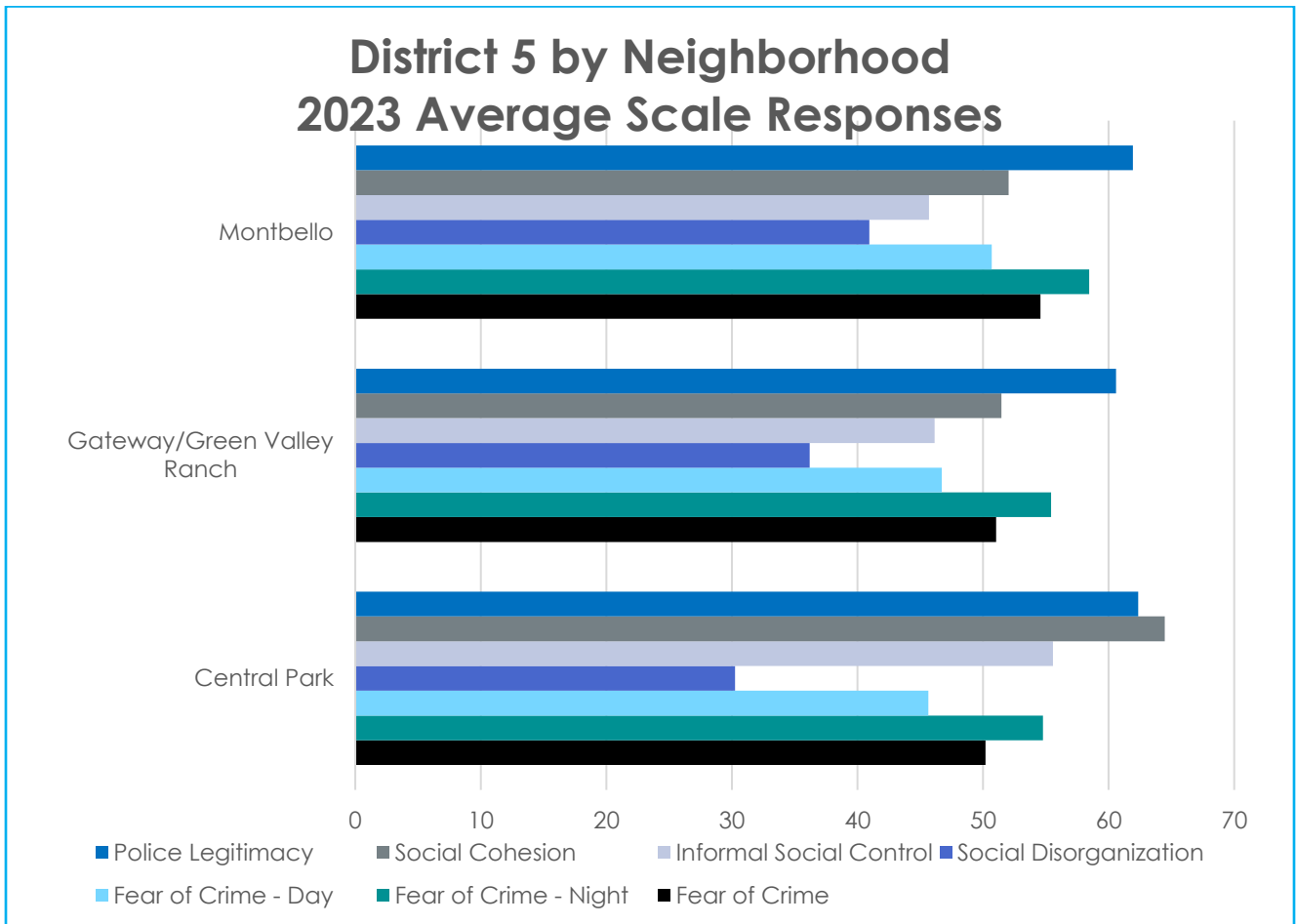
Summary of Findings for District 5

The top public safety concerns for District 5 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Community Capacity which were also identified as the top Citywide public safety concerns. The only difference in public safety concerns at the Citywide and District 5 levels are that Traffic Safety was ranked third highest and Homelessness was ranked fourth highest concern in District 5. The most prominent themes residents in District 5 noted in their narrative responses are Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Violent Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. In comparison, the themes most noted by residents Citywide were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were relatively consistent with the entirety of District 5 as Central Park was the only neighborhood who shared the same top public safety concerns. Additionally, Central Park was the only neighborhood to have the same top five narrative themes as District 5. However, several of the neighborhoods shared at least four top concerns and themes as District 5 as a whole.

The results of the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that District 5 has a scale rating of high-moderate (60.7) Police Legitimacy, high-moderate (59.9) Social Cohesion,

moderate (52.0) Informal Social Control, low (32.8) Social Disorganization, and moderate (50.7) Fear of Crime (46.1-Day, 55.3-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 5 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 60.7 is 3.1 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 5 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 59.9, which is 5.8 points higher than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating of 52.0 for Informal Social Control in District 5 is 6.0 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. District 5 average Social Disorganization is 32.8, which is 8.4 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 5 of 46.1 is 1.4 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 5 of 55.3 is 1.2 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 5 of 50.7 is 1.3 points more than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are highly consistent with District 5 results. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 5 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 54.1 is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide rating of 52.3 for DPD specifically. The rating of police in the United States Generally in District 5 of 54.6 is 2.9 points higher than the Citywide rating of 51.7.

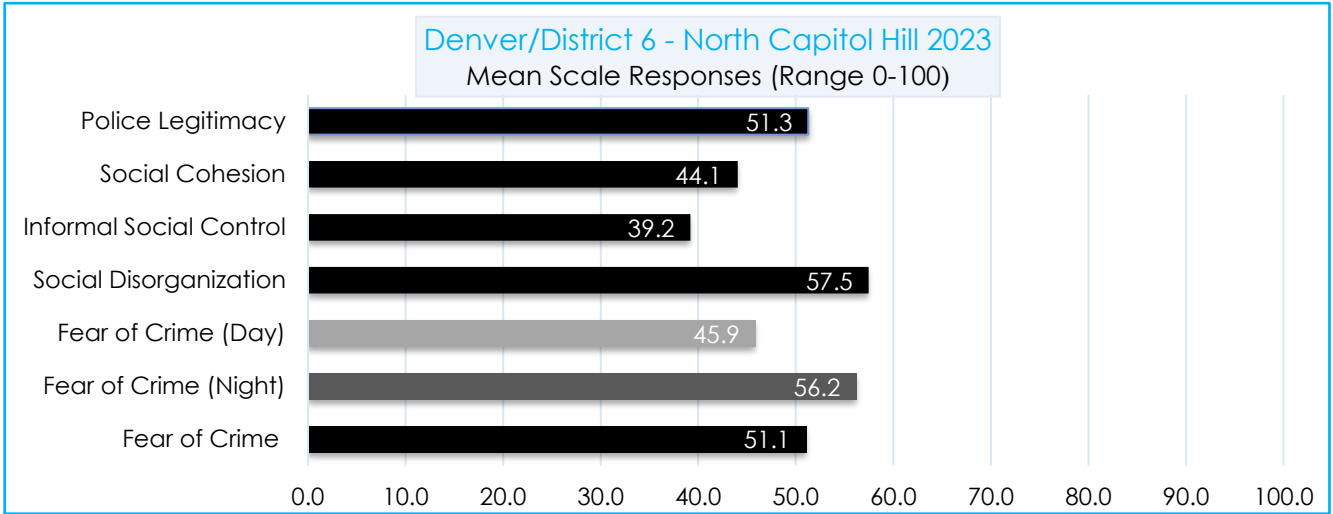


Denver/District 6 – North Capitol Hill (2023 N=52)

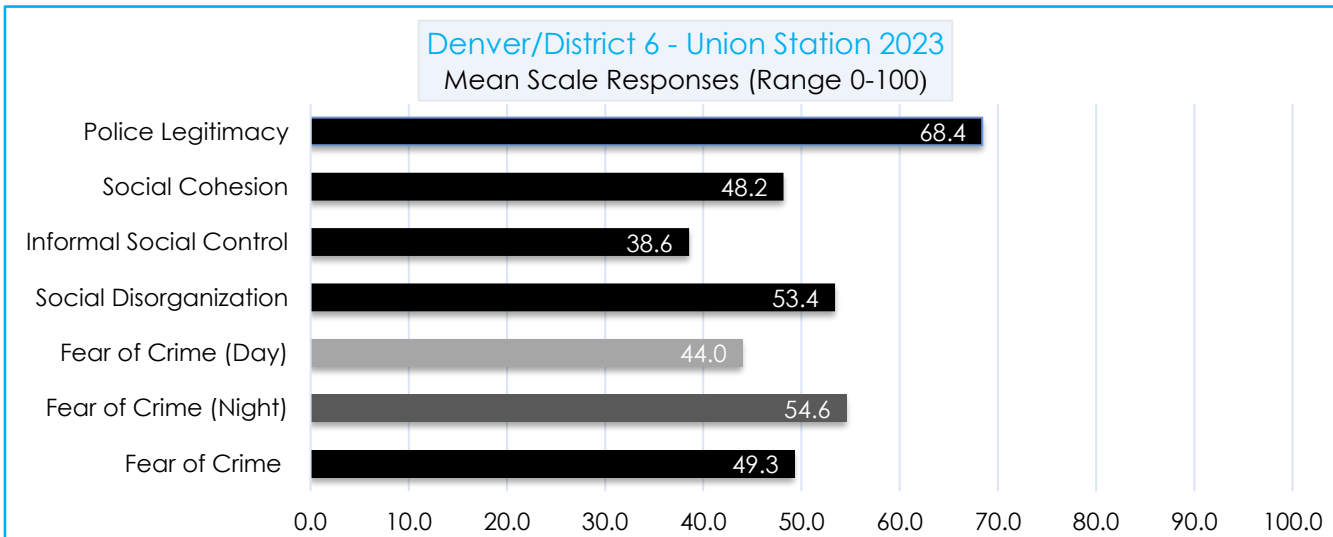

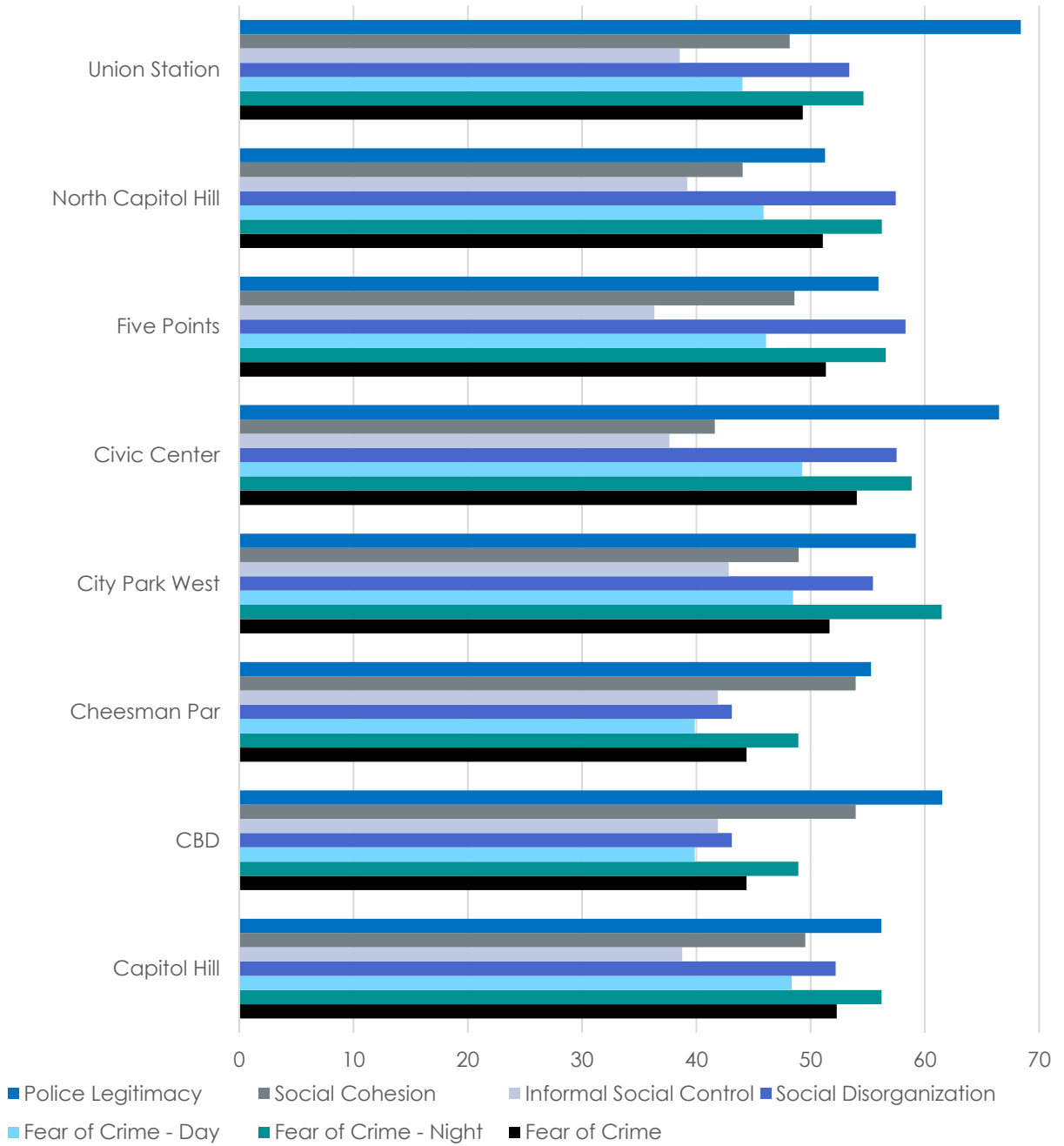


Summary of Findings for District 6

The top public safety concerns for District 6 are Homelessness, Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, and Drugs & Alcohol. Four of five concerns are the same as the top Citywide public safety concerns which were Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, Traffic Safety, and Community Capacity. Notable differences between District 6 and Citywide concerns are the rankings of the items, as well as Drugs & Alcohol replacing Community Capacity in District 6. The most prominent themes residents in District 6 noted in their narrative responses are Public Order Crime, Traffic Safety, Fear of Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability, and Property Crime. District 6 were similar to the Citywide themes which were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. The only theme that District 6 and Citywide had departed in was Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were highly consistent with the entirety of District 6 as seven neighborhoods shared the same top public safety concerns (Capitol Hill, CBD, City Park West, Civic Center, Five Points, North Capitol Hill, Union Station). Narrative themes at the neighborhood level were also consistent with District 3 as 10 neighborhoods shared the same top themes as District 3 as a whole (Baker, Belcaro, Cherry Creek, Hampden South, Platt Park, Speer, University, University Hills, Wash Park West, Windsor).

The results of the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that District 6 has a scale rating of high-moderate (58.1) Police Legitimacy, moderate (45.8) Social Cohesion, low (36.7) Informal Social Control, moderate (53.8) Social Disorganization, and moderate (51.3) Fear of Crime (46.5-Day, 56.1-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 6 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 58.1 is just 0.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 6 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 45.8, which is 8.3 points lower than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating of 36.7 for District 6 Informal Social Control is 3.3 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The findings on the scale items for District 6 show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 53.8, which is 12.6 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 6 of 46.5 is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 whereas the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 6 of 56.1 is two points higher than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 6 of 51.3 is 1.9 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are highly consistent with District 6 as a whole with Cheesman Park being the only neighborhood to have a noticeable difference when compared to District 6 results. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 6 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 52.4 is just 0.1 point higher than the Citywide rating of 52.3. Lastly, the District 6 rating of police in the United States Generally of 52.7 is one point higher than the Citywide rating of 51.7 for police in the United States Generally.

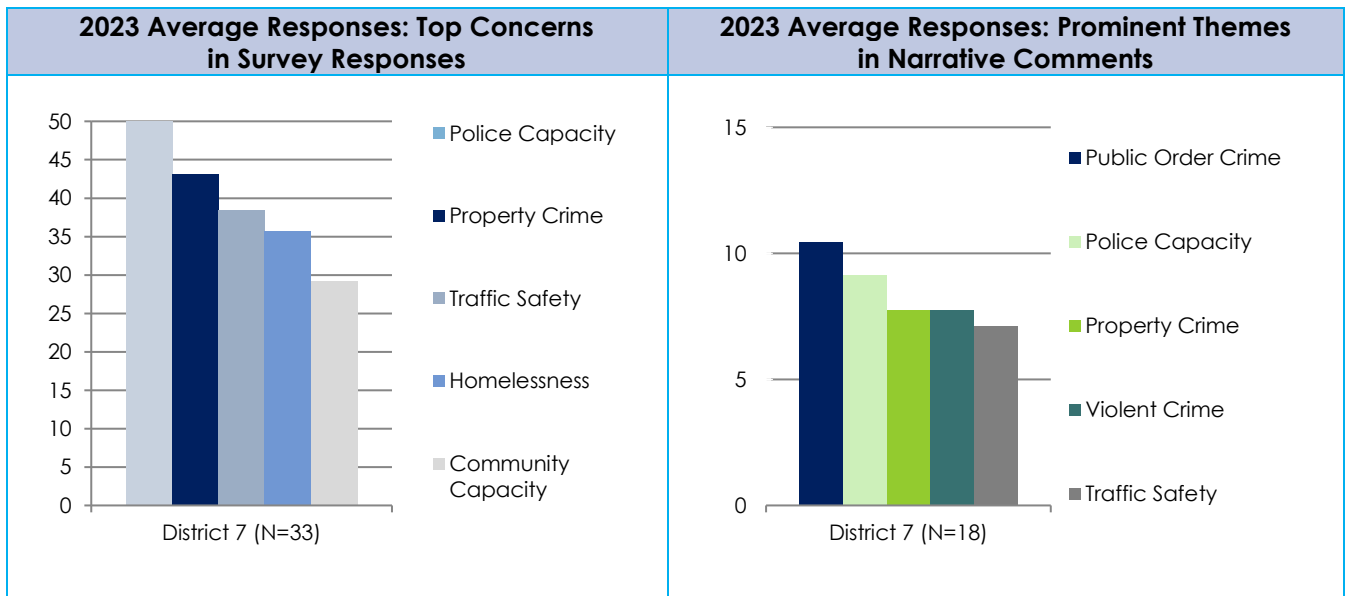

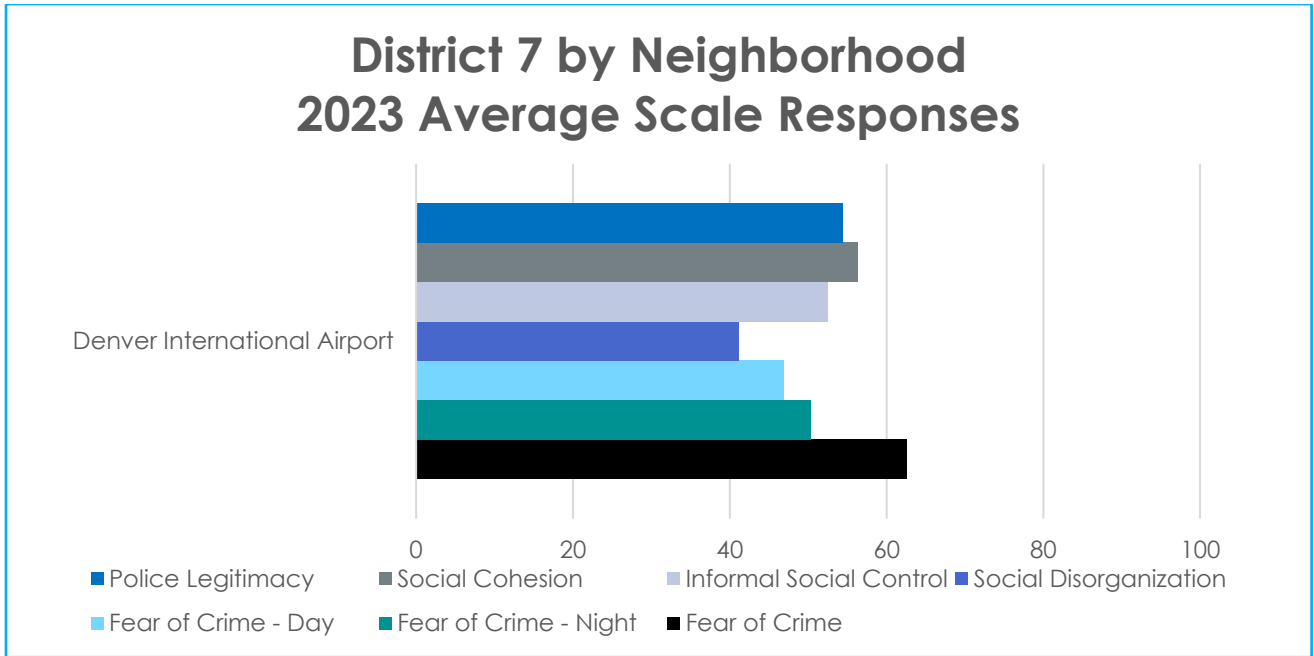


Summary of Findings for District 7

The top public safety concerns for District 7 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Community Capacity. All concerns are aligned with the top Citywide public safety concerns which were Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, Traffic Safety, and Community Capacity. Notable differences between District 7 and Citywide concerns are the rankings of the items. The most prominent themes residents in District 7 noted in their narrative responses are Public Order Crime, Police Capacity, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Community Capacity. District 7 themes were similar to the Citywide themes which were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. The only theme that District 7 and Citywide had departed in was Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were highly consistent with the entirety of District 7 as the neighborhood shared the same top public safety concerns besides Fear of Crime at the neighborhood level.

The results of the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that District 7 has a scale rating of high-moderate (61.9) Police Legitimacy, moderate (50.0) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (44.6) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (40.2) Social Disorganization, and moderate (53.2) Fear of Crime (51.2-Day, 55.1-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 7 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 61.9 is 4.3 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 7 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 50.0, which is 54.1 points lower than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating of 44.6 for District 7 Informal Social Control is 0.6 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The findings on the scale items for District 7 show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 40.2, which is one point lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 7 of 51.2 is 6.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 whereas the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 7 of 55.1 is one point higher than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 7 of 53.2 is 3.8 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 7 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 62.8 is 10.5 points higher than the

Citywide rating of 52.3. Lastly, the District 7 rating of police in the United States Generally of 56.6 is 4.9 points higher than the Citywide rating of 51.7 for police in the United States Generally.



2023 Denver Public Safety Survey Summary of Findings

The top public safety concerns for District 1 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Drugs & Alcohol. In comparison with the top public safety concerns Citywide, residents in District 1 shared the same top four of five public safety concerns including Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, and Traffic Safety. Drugs & Alcohol replaced Community Capacity in District 1 when compared to Citywide results. Additionally, the rankings of Homelessness and Traffic Safety switched in District 1 as respondents ranked Traffic Safety as the third highest concern and Homelessness as the fourth highest concern. The most prominent theme indices residents in District 1 identified in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability, and Violent Crime. In comparison with the top Citywide theme indices (Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability, Fear of Crime), Fear of Crime fell out of the top five while Laws/Policy/Accountability became the fourth most prominent theme in District 1. Violent crime dropped to the fifth most prominent theme. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were relatively diverse with six neighborhoods having the same top public safety concerns as the entirety of District 1 (Auraria, Globeville, Lincoln Park, Sun Valley, Villa Park, West Colfax). However, Sunnyside and Villa Park were the only neighborhoods to have the same top 5 narrative themes as District 1 as a whole.

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety suggest that District 1 have scale ratings of moderate (54.6) Police Legitimacy, moderate (51.7) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (40.5) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (41.7) Social Disorganization, and moderate (47.8) Fear of Crime (42.6-Day, 53.1-Night). The average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 54.6 in District 1 is three points lower than the Citywide average rating of 57.6. District 1 average scale rating

for Social Cohesion is 51.7, which is 3.6 points lower than the Citywide average of 54.1. Additionally, the average Informal Social Control scale rating of 40.5 in District 1 is 3.5 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The findings on the scale items for District 1 show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 41.7, which is only 0.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. Social Disorganization is the only scale item that District 1 rates higher than Citywide. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 1 of 42.6 is 2.1 points less than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 1 of 53.1 is just one point less than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Finally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 1 of 47.8 is 1.6 points less than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are different depending on the neighborhood with some very similar to District 1 as a whole (e.g., Chaffee Park) while others show rather drastic differences (e.g., Auraria, Regis, Lincoln Park) reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the district. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 1 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 50.9 is 1.4 points lower than the Citywide rating of 52.3 for DPD Specifically. Finally, District 1's rating of police in the United States Generally of 49.4 is 2.3 points lower than the Citywide rating of 51.7 for police in the United States Generally.

The top public safety concerns for District 2 in 2023 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Community Capacity. These are the same concerns reported at the Citywide level. The only difference between the top five concerns in District 2 compared to Citywide is that District 2 ranked Traffic Safety as the third most prominent concern and Homelessness as the fourth most prominent concern. The most prominent themes reported in District 2 narrative comments are Traffic Safety, Property Crime, Public Order Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were primarily consistent with seven neighborhoods having the same top public safety concerns as the entirety of District 2 (City Park, Congress Park, Hale, Montclair, North Park Hill, Northeast Park Hill, South Park Hill). However, City Park, Hale, North Park Hill, and South Park Hill were the only neighborhoods to have the same top 5 narrative themes as District 2 as a whole.

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety suggest that District 2 scale ratings show moderate (51.5) Police Legitimacy, moderate (54.5) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (40.5) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (43.9) Social Disorganization, and moderate (49.3) Fear of Crime (44.6 - Day, 53.8 - Night). The findings on the scale items for District 2 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 51.5 is 6.1 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 2 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 55.5, which is 2.4 points higher than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating in District 2 for Informal Social Control is 40.5, which is 3.5 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The average on the scale for District 2 Social Disorganization is 43.9, which is just 2.7 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 2 of 44.6 is 0.1 units lower than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 2 of 53.8 is 0.3 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 2 of 49.3 is 0.1 less than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are different depending on the neighborhood with some very similar to District 1 as a whole (e.g., Cole, North Park

Hill, Northeast Park Hill) while others show rather drastic differences (e.g., Clayton, Montclair) reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the district. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 2 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 47.6 is 4.7 points lower than the Citywide rating of 52.3. Finally, in ratings of the police in the United States Generally, the average response for District 2 was 48.0 – 3.7 points lower than the Citywide rating of 51.7.

The top public safety concerns for District 3 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, Traffic Safety and Community Capacity. The top concerns in District 3 mirrored the Citywide concerns in rankings and items. The most prominent themes respondents in District 3 included in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Property Crime, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. In comparison, the themes most noted by residents Citywide were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. Although themes are mostly consistent at the Citywide and District 3 levels, there are a few notable differences. Property Crime rose to the second highest theme while Public Order Crime fell to the third highest theme in District 3. Fear of Crime rose from fifth to the fourth highest theme. Finally, Violent Crime did not make the top five in District 3 while Laws/Policy/Accountability became the fourth most prominent theme. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were highly consistent with the entirety of District 3 as 21 neighborhoods shared the same top public safety concerns (Belcaro, Cherry Creek, Cory-Merrill, Country Club, Goldsmith, Hampden, Hampden South, Hilltop, Indian Creek, Overland, Platt Park, Rosedale, Southmoor Park, University, University Hills, University Park, Virginia Village, Wash Park, Wash Park West, Washington Virginia Vale, Wellshire). Narrative themes at the neighborhood level were also consistent with District 3 as 10 neighborhoods shared the same top themes as District 3 as a whole (Baker, Belcaro, Cherry Creek, Hampden South, Platt Park, Speer, University, University Hills, Wash Park West, Windsor).

The results on scales measuring community perceptions of public safety in District 3 shows scale rating of high-moderate Police Legitimacy (61.2), high-moderate Social Cohesion (58.6), moderate Informal Social Control (49.1), low Social Disorganization (35.9) and moderate (48.7) Fear of Crime (43.9-Day, 53.4-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 3 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 61.2 is 3.6 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 3 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 58.6 which is 4.5 points higher than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating for Informal Social Control in District 3 is 49.1 – 5.1 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The average Social Disorganization scale of 35.9 in District 3 is 5.3 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 3 of 43.9 is 0.8 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 53.4 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 3 of 53.6 is also 0.2 points below the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 3 of 48.7 is 0.7 points less than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are different depending on the neighborhood with some very similar to District 3 as a whole (e.g., Cory-Merrill, Speer, Washington Virginia Vale) while others show rather drastic differences (e.g., Cherry Creek, Hampden, Goldsmith) reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the district. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the average rating for DPD Specifically in District 3 of 53.2 is 0.9 points higher than the

Citywide rating of 52.3. For police in the United States Generally, District 3 had an average response of 54.8 which was 3.1 points higher than the Citywide rating of 51.7.

The top public safety concerns for District 4 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Community Capacity. These are the same concerns that were reported at the Citywide level. The only difference in top public safety concerns between the Citywide and District 4 levels were that Traffic Safety was ranked third and Homelessness was ranked fourth in District 4. The most prominent themes residents in District 4 noted in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Violent Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability which were also the same themes reported in the top Citywide rankings. The only difference was in ranking as Violent Crime moved to the third most prominent theme and Property Crime dropped to the fourth most prominent theme in District 4. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were relatively consistent with the entirety of District 4 as seven neighborhoods shared the same top public safety concerns (Barnum, Barnum West, Bear Valley, Fort Logan, Harvey Park, Harvey Park South, Marston).

The results of the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that District 4 has a scale rating of moderate (55.3) Police Legitimacy, moderate (50.4) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (41.6) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (38.5) Social Disorganization, and moderate (47.6) Fear of Crime (43.7-Day, 51.6-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 4 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 55.3 is 2.3 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 4 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 50.4 which is 3.7 points lower than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating of 41.6 for Informal Social Control in District 4 is 2.4 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. Further, the findings on the scale items for District 4 show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 38.5, which is 2.7 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 4 of 43.7 is one point lower than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 4 of 51.6 is 2.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 4 of 47.6 is 1.8 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are mainly consistent with District 4 as a whole (e.g., Ruby Hill, Harvey Park South) while a few show rather drastic differences (e.g., Barnum, Fort Logan) reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the district. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 4 show that the rating of DPD Specifically of 51.1 is 2.2 points lower than the Citywide rating of 52.3. District 4 rating of police in the United States Generally was 50.8, which is 0.9 points lower than the Citywide rating of 51.7 for the United States Generally.

The top public safety concerns for District 5 are Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, Homelessness, and Community Capacity which were also identified as the top Citywide public safety concerns. The only difference in public safety concerns at the Citywide and District 5 levels are that Traffic Safety was ranked third highest and Homelessness was ranked fourth highest concern in District 5. The most prominent themes residents in District 5 noted in their narrative responses are Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Violent Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. In comparison, the themes most noted by residents Citywide were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety

concerns were relatively consistent with the entirety of District 5 as Central Park was the only neighborhood who shared the same top public safety concerns. Additionally, Central Park was the only neighborhood to have the same top five narrative themes as District 5. However, several of the neighborhoods shared at least four top concerns and themes as District 5 as a whole.

The results of the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that District 5 has a scale rating of high-moderate (60.7) Police Legitimacy, high-moderate (59.9) Social Cohesion, moderate (52.0) Informal Social Control, low (32.8) Social Disorganization, and moderate (50.7) Fear of Crime (46.1-Day, 55.3-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 5 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 60.7 is 3.1 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 5 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 59.9, which is 5.8 points higher than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating of 52.0 for Informal Social Control in District 5 is 6.0 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. District 5 average Social Disorganization is 32.8, which is 8.4 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for District 5 of 46.1 is 1.4 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 while the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 5 of 55.3 is 1.2 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 5 of 50.7 is 1.3 points more than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are highly consistent with District 5 results. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 5 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 54.1 is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide rating of 52.3 for DPD specifically. The rating of police in the United States Generally in District 5 of 54.6 is 2.9 points higher than the Citywide rating of 51.7.

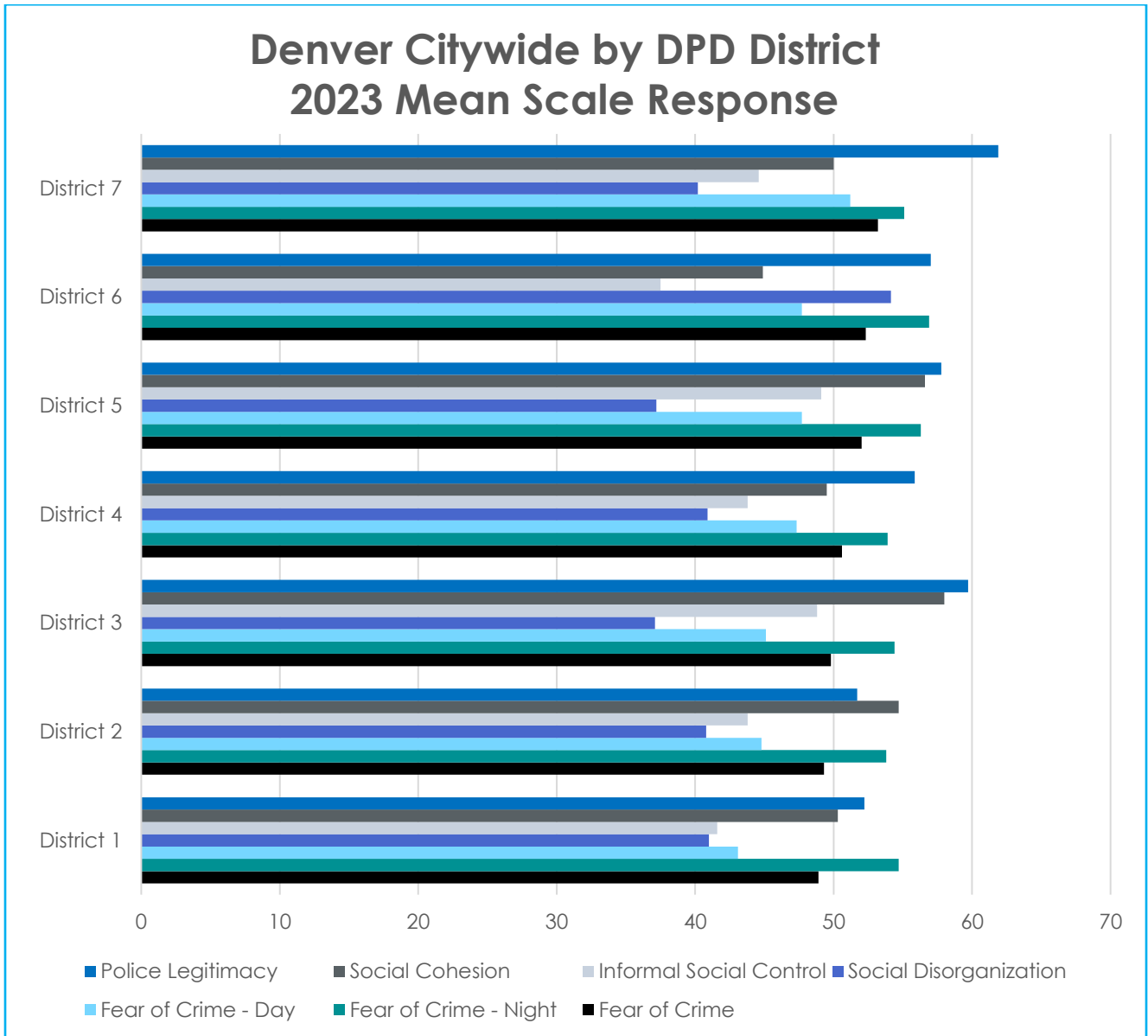
The top public safety concerns for District 6 are Homelessness, Police Capacity, Property Crime, Traffic Safety, and Drugs & Alcohol. Four of five concerns are the same as the top Citywide public safety concerns which were Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness, Traffic Safety, and Community Capacity. Notable differences between District 6 and Citywide concerns are the rankings of the items, as well as Drugs & Alcohol replacing Community Capacity in District 6. The most prominent themes residents in District 6 noted in their narrative responses are Public Order Crime, Traffic Safety, Fear of Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability, and Property Crime. District 6 mostly related to the Citywide themes which were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Violent Crime, and Fear of Crime. The only theme that District 6 and Citywide did not have in common was Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the neighborhood level, the top public safety concerns were highly consistent with the entirety of District 6 as seven neighborhoods shared the same top public safety concerns (Capitol Hill, CBD, City Park West, Civic Center, Five Points, North Capitol Hill, Union Station).

The results of the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that District 6 has a scale rating of high-moderate (58.1) Police Legitimacy, moderate (45.8) Social Cohesion, low (36.7) Informal Social Control, moderate (53.8) Social Disorganization, and moderate (51.3) Fear of Crime (46.5-Day, 56.1-Night). The findings on the scale items for District 6 show that the average scale rating for Police Legitimacy of 58.1 is just 0.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 57.6 on this scale item. District 6 average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 45.8, which is 8.3 points lower than the Citywide average of 54.1. The average scale rating of 36.7 for District 6 Informal Social Control is 3.3 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 44.0. The findings on the scale items for District 6 show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 53.8, which is 12.6 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 41.2 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating

for District 6 of 46.5 is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 44.7 whereas the Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for District 6 of 56.1 is two points higher than the Citywide average rating of 54.1. Additionally, the General Fear of Crime average scale rating for District 6 of 51.3 is 1.9 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 49.4. At the neighborhood level, results on the scales are highly consistent with District 6 as a whole with Cheesman Park being the only neighborhood to have a noticeable difference when compared to District 6 results. Regarding the items asking respondents to rate their views of DPD Specifically and police in the United States Generally, the findings for District 6 show that the rating for DPD Specifically of 52.4 is just 0.1 point higher than the Citywide rating of 52.3. Lastly, the District 6 rating of police in the United States Generally of 52.7 is one point higher than the Citywide rating of 51.7 for police in the United States Generally.

(District 7)

The Denver Public Safety Survey results offer a picture of the public safety concerns of residents of Denver at the city, district, and neighborhood levels. At the neighborhood level, results differ by district and neighborhood reflecting heterogeneous neighborhoods on measures of community perception of public safety within the district. The scale data can be used in conjunction with the top concerns and prominent themes to better understand the nature of communities and neighborhoods and their unique public safety issues. Concerns of residents within any given neighborhood may differ in terms of perceptions of public safety with respect to police legitimacy, informal social control, social cohesion, fear of crime, and social disorganization. The survey findings on the top concerns, most prominent themes, and scale ratings of features of the community that impact public safety can be used at the citywide, district, and neighborhood levels to inform and guide law enforcement in developing priorities and to guide strategies in response to distinct community concerns. The results provide a snapshot of the nature of perceptions of public safety. Ideally, a healthy community with positive police-community engagement will have high Police Legitimacy, low Social Disorganization, high Informal Social Control, high Social Cohesion, low Fear of Crime, and positive perception and high knowledge of the DPD NSP initiative. Survey findings can assist communities to target areas of improvement with respect to areas that stray from the ideal and negatively impact public safety.



Implications for Denver’s Neighborhood Safety Plans

The quantitative survey findings of the top public safety concerns, prominent themes identified in the narrative comments, and community perceptions regarding issues related to public safety offer comprehensive information based on survey findings from 6,341 respondents who live and/or work in Denver. The information can be used to inform and guide the DPD NSP priorities to ensure that resident concerns are considered in the development and evolution of the DPD’s NSPs for the city of Denver, DPD districts, and district neighborhoods.

The survey findings can be used to assist DPD, community leaders, and residents to better understand the distinct concerns, perceptions of public safety of residents within neighborhoods, and the nature of the community. Residents within any given community differ with respect to concerns about crime

and perceptions of public safety. The survey findings at the district and neighborhood levels can be used to inform the Denver Police Department in developing DPD NSP priorities at the district and neighborhood levels and to guide strategies in response to distinct community concerns.

The top public safety concerns coupled with the most prominent themes for each district and for each neighborhood inform the DPD NSP priorities to reflect the timely concerns of residents. The community perceptions regarding public safety as measured through the survey instrument provides a snapshot of resident concerns about public safety and views on police legitimacy, social disorganization, informal social control, social cohesion, and fear of crime across the city in each DPD district and individual neighborhoods. Ideally, a healthy community with positive police-community relations will have high police legitimacy, low social disorganization, high informal social control and social cohesion, and low fear of crime. Survey findings can assist DPD, the city of Denver, and neighborhoods to target areas of improvement with respect to scale items that reflect resident perceptions of community public safety areas that stray from the ideal and negatively impact public safety.
